# Bibliography



<u>Bibliography</u>: a list of books and other resources used for a report or project. It gives credit to the authors of the materials you used in creating your report or your project. It should be done in a specific way.

### For a Book: What you need to locate and write down

- the author's first and last name
- the title of the book
- the copyright date (the year the book was published, usually on the back of the title page)



**Book:** (1<sup>st</sup> line starts at the margin. All lines after that get indented.)

Author's last name, First name. Title of the Book. Copyright date.

Jenkins, Steve. <u>How to Clean a Hippopotamus: a Look at Unusual Animal Partnerships.</u> 2010.

## For a Magazine: What you need to locate and write down

- the author's first and last name
- the title of the magazine article
- the title of the magazine
- the date the magazine was published (usually includes the month and the year)



**Magazine:** (1<sup>st</sup> line starts at the margin. All lines after that get indented.)

Author's last name, First name. "Title of the Article." *Title of the Magazine*. Date the magazine was published.

(If you are handwriting your bibliography, underline the <u>Title of the Magazine</u> instead of using *italics*.)

# For a Website: What you need to locate and write or copy & paste

- the author's first and last name
- the title of the webpage
- the date you used the website to find information
- the website address (URL)



**Website:** (1<sup>st</sup> line starts at the margin. All lines after that get indented.)

#### If there is an Author:

Author's last name, First name. "Title of Webpage." Date You Used the Website to Find the Information. Website Address.

Maunz, Shay. "Found: Plant-Eating Shark." January 29, 2019. https://www.timeforkids.com/g56/found-plant-eating-shark-2/.

#### If there is **NOT** an Author:

Name of the Website. "Title of Webpage." Date You Used the Website to Find the Information. Website Address.

#### Example:

Britannica School. "Kangaroo." January 26, 2019. http://school.eb.com/levels/elementary/article/353331.

# For a Brochure: What you need to locate and write down

- the author's first and last name OR the group or organization (if given)
- the title of the brochure
- the copyright date (the year the brochure was published)

**Brochure:** (1<sup>st</sup> line starts at the margin. All lines after that get indented.)

Author's last name, First name. Title of the Brochure. Copyright date. (brochure).

#### Example:

Cherokee, North Carolina. 2009. (brochure).



## For an App: What you need to locate and write down

- the author's first and last name or the creator or who is offering the app
- the title of the app
- the year the app was published or last updated
- the title of the website where the app was downloaded

**App:** (1<sup>st</sup> line starts at the margin. All lines after that get indented.)

Author's last name, First name. *Title of the App*. Year published or updated. Website where App was Downloaded. (app).
